NEWS FROM DAVE GALARNEAU, ASSESSOR

The tentative assessment roll will be published on May 1st. All **Change of Assessment notices** will be **mailed by that date**. *If you do not receive one, your assessment did not change*. The market is up 3% since last year. Since there is a 5% tolerance allowed by the State, **no reassessment is needed** for us to **maintain our 100% equalization rate status**.

Grievance Day will be held on Wednesday, May 29th from 4 – 8 pm at the Town Hall. All grievances must be submitted by <u>regular mail</u> or <u>in person</u> and be in the hands of the Board of Assessment Review <u>by 8 pm that night</u>.

The grievance process will follow the proper protocols for this type of public meeting:

1. A **sign-in sheet** will be available. Petitioners (complainants) must write their name on the sign-in sheet so we are able to call you in the right order. **Grievance Form RP524** must be completed and signed before meeting with the Grievance Board (blank forms will be made available).

2. When called, you will be **sworn in**. All documents submitted, and testimony given, will be a matter of record. **Meetings will be recorded**.

3. Petitioners will then be allowed to present their case and submit documents in support.

4. The Assessor will then have the opportunity to **provide documentation** in support of the assessed value.

5. Once the Board of Assessment Review has received all documentation from both sides, they will close the meeting.

Finally, the petitioner will receive notice by mail of the Board's determination.

Remember, the Board of Assessment Review is an **independent body**, as prescribed by law. Their decisions must be accepted and changes made to the assessment roll by the Assessor. **No decisions are made during the open meeting.**

Any time before or during Grievance Day, the petitioner and assessor may enter into a **Stipulation Agreement**. The property owner also has the right to **meet with the Assessor anytime during the year to resolve any assessment issues**. Most issues can be resolved outside of grievance.

If you do file a grievance, here are some helpful hints:

DO NOT focus on taxes, how much your assessment increased, or by what percent. DO NOT focus on how much you went up in recent years. DO focus on a fair value of your property by providing recent pictures, a recent appraisal, or purchase price. DO provide a short list of <u>similar</u> properties with assessments.

Your assessor can assist you with information on your property and others. Sale prices, assessments, and property data within the town are public information. Your Assessment Office has all of this, and it is available to the public.

License Your Dogs

State Law requires all dogs 4 months of age or older MUST be licensed with the Saranac Town Clerk.

Local Law

It shall be unlawful for any owner of any dog in the town to permit or allow such dog to engage in habitual howling, barking, crying or whining or to conduct itself in such a manner as to unreasonably and habitually annoy or disturb any person other than the owner of the dog, regardless of whether or not the dog is on the owner's premises.

Missing Dog

If your dog is **missing** or you pick up a **stray**, aside from leaving a voicemail message, **posting a photo on Facebook** helps get owners and pets reunited.

During the hot summer months, please make sure your dog has adequate water.

HOW DO I KNOW WHEN AND WHAT TO PLANT???

According to the **Old Farmer's Almanac**, old farmers (maybe young ones, too) had an **easy way to know when to plant**. When the **weeds start to grow** in your garden, it's time to plant your hardy vegetables. March heralds the beginning of spring to many of us. We can hardly wait to get outside and prepare for planting. There are some **things you should do before it's time to put seeds in the ground**. Here are some **suggestions**:

Don't work your soil while it's still too wet. According to **Purdue University**, "Working wet soil will pack soil particles tightly, leaving less room for water and air to penetrate. Compacted soil also makes it more difficult for plant roots and gardening equipment to move through the soil."

<u>**Pull weeds when you see them**</u>, especially before seed planting time, as weeds will outcompete most anything if they are already established.

There are seeds to start in early spring, late March, April, and early May. These are referred to as **cool season vegetables**. They have the advantage of growing when the soil and air temps are cooler in spring and can be seeded again in late summer-early fall, when temps are cooler again. The **warm season vegetables** require warmer soil to germinate and higher air temperatures to grow.

I have a **one-page fact sheet listing the times** certain vegetables can be planted for best results, with a **problem guide** on the back **I would be happy to share** with you. Email me at <u>jmw442@cornell.edu</u>. Put "fact sheet" in the subject line and I'll send one off to you.

Master Gardener Volunteers and I do identifications and/or diagnostics of insects and plant diseases or problems. There is no fee for the services we offer. NEWS FROM TOWN SUPERVISOR NAPPER

200 years! Happy Birthday Saranac! The Town of Saranac was officially split off from the Town of Plattsburgh on May 1,1824. Needless to say, much has changed. 1802 is generally considered when the **first settlement** occurred. Most of the land was forested then. **Stonewalls** found in many of our forests indicate how much effort was expended to develop our town into a predominantly agricultural area. Time and the many changes in how we live and work have resulted in much of the **forest returning**.

We are planning several events to mark our bicentennial. Early on we have our Easter Egg Hunt on March 30th. On April 8th, the Solar Eclipse occurs. On that day we will have a Birthday Cake at the Bowen Road Park. We also expect to have protective glasses available for those who lack them. Other things will happen later, including a return of the Town of Saranac Day in September.

Besides the everyday things we do to keep our town running, we continue to **press forward with other projects**. We continue to **renovate the Town Hall**. The **kitchen is complete** and now the **focus is on the main hall**. Once the weather warms, we will **complete the renovations at the pool**. We will now have an **ADA compliant bathroom and renovated bathhouses**. Partnering again with the **Saranac Fire Department** and the **Redford American Legion**, we expect to make **additions to the Rita Wilson Playground**. We also intend to make **improvements at the Standish Playground**. Our **recreation programs** have been well-received again this fall and winter. **I appreciate all the efforts of the staff, coaches, and parents**.

The last year has been challenging at our **Highway Department**. Until very recently, we had been **short-staffed for a long time**. **Severe weather last summer** damaged many of our roads. We estimated our **damages at over \$400,000**. FEMA Funding is available, but the process is long and frustrating. Considerable work still needs to be done, along with the usual tasks.

As I have mentioned before, there appears to be **a large number of unlicensed dogs** in Saranac. The fact a local person was forced to undergo rabies treatment illustrates how important it is to have **vaccination status verified**. Our Dog Control Officer is looking into **how to achieve better compliance**.

I expect 2024 will be a busy and exciting year. As always, please make us aware of your concerns and ideas.

Hi, everyone. I trust you have had a warm and safe winter. This is just a reminder that ALL dogs four months of age or older must be licensed in the municipality in which they are harbored. To license your dog, you will need proof of current rabies vaccination from your veterinarian and proof of being spayed or neutered, if applicable. Renewal dog license notices are sent out the month prior to expiration and may be returned by mail to the Town Clerk.

If you have a **permanent handicap tag** and it's time for renewal, **call me and I will send you a new one**. Hours I am present in the office are 9:00 -1:00 Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Since I began my position as Highway Superintendent, we have rehired **Brian Cane and Michael Alexander** back as **mechanics**. They have worked hard to get Truck #8 back up and running and plowing. It has been down since last summer. We had one of our trucks back into a ditch and tip onto its side. It had to be towed back to the shop. Brian and Mike worked on the truck and had it ready to go back to work in two days. It had a broken mirror and the dip tub came unhooked in the fuel tank; the rest of the truck was fine. With the decent weather, we have started work at the end of Clark Hill Road and some of Collins Road. As soon as possible, we will start **sweeping** and get ready to do some **shoulder work** throughout the town. As **weather improves**, we will be starting on some of the **side roads that have need of fill** (dirt and gravel) to help with the mud and to make them passable.

DEFENSIVE DRIVING POINTS & INSURANCE REDUCTION

Now, how about those neighbors of ours who need to take the Defensive Driving Course soon and they are willing to do the online version? Well, we are happy to share this very low-cost option for only **\$24.95**.

ADDITIONAL TRAINING SERVICES is currently offering the lowest cost for classroom AND online opportunities for Saranac Town residents to save \$\$\$ on your automobile and motorcycle insurance costs and at the same time reduce **your NYS Driver's License Points** up to a maximum of **4-points reduced every 18 months**. You may take the course every year and a half for a 4-point reduction. **10% reduction off of your Automobile / Motorcycle insurance costs** is for **THREE YEARS (36 months).**

The New York State approved IPIRP, otherwise known as the online **Internet Points and Insurance Reduction Course,** is the same length as the in-person class, 6 hours in total. Go to: <u>www.additionaltraining.com</u> and click through the Online Defensive Driving links. With this option, you have 30 days to complete the class with as many log-in sessions as you like. You must complete the course within 30 days from your sign-up date. This allows flexibility and convenience.

<u>Please note:</u> "Keystroke Recognition" technology is used, determining who you are by how you type, eliminating the need for phone calls or cameras to validate it is you taking the course. This does require that you use the same device throughout the session, since switching from a cell phone or a tablet/iPad device to a computer would change the way you are typing and not be recognizable. It is a VERY simple and easy way of taking the course without bothersome validation steps other online options employ.

I am always available if you have any questions or problems. Call **518-578-9626** and I will be there ready to assist you. After last summer's many days of rain and the nonstop pumping of flooded basements, we are looking forward to a dry and warm summer so stay safe and save some money for your summertime activities by taking the class online.


